***Welcome to the Live Not Lukewarm Sunday Scripture Reflection for October 3<sup>rd</sup> the 27<sup>th</sup> Sunday of Ordinary time Cycle B.***

When God created the first two humans on earth He intended them to become one flesh and thereby be fruitful and multiply. He did not form the earth for the sole purpose of two people only. Adam and Eve *became one* in order to produce children who would join them in giving glory to God.

Jesus cared for all people, especially those who had no voice in society. In Jesus' time, children had no voice, so he was very concerned with how they were treated. Children are innocent and young children love unconditionally as God loves us. As children get older, they can lose their temper and become angry. But just as quickly as they do that, they are also quick to forgive, forget and move on to the next thing. We must never lose and always cherish the awe and wonder with which children experience the world and others. That is where our faith can do the greatest good. We should see what God sees through the eyes of mercy; that everyone has the potential for holiness and greatness.

God wants us to be childlike in quickly forgiving and moving forward. He wants us to live our lives according to His commandments and not become hard of heart. When our hearts are hardened, and being human we cannot help to fall into that abyss at times, we would do well to ask God for help in returning to be the kind of people formed in His likeness.
